A huge crowd estimated at nearly 500 people were in attendance at the PDFA Fall Sale held in Altoona.

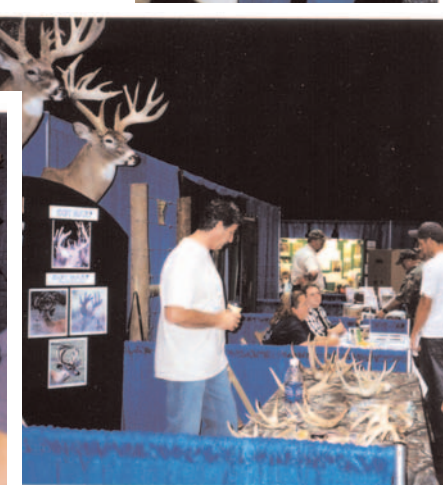
The total gross from the sale was \$890,07, made up of \$722,450 in animal sales and \$167,625 in semen sales. Sale average for animals was \$5,391 and sale average for semen was \$794 per straw.

The top selling doe was consigned by Curt Waldvogel, Antigo, Wisconsin and purchased by S & S Enterprises (Billy Sage and John Shadd, Baldwin, Florida). The selling price was \$52,000. We believe this to be the highest selling animal in Deer Farming history.

The sale was managed by White Tail Sales, Tuscumbia, Missouri.

Fall Sale Chairman Harry Strawser stated, "Let's shoot for a higher sale total next year. \$1,000,000+++ Is it possible??"

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Hello Everyone:

September 15 and 16, 2006 found us at the Jaffa Mosque in Altoona, PA for our 5th Annual Select Trophy and Breeders Auction. The new auction schedule which included an outdoor chicken bar-b-que along with the evening Trophy Select Breeder Auction proved to be a great success with this years auction total hitting a new high of \$890,000.00. This total is up 450,000.00 or double last years total. We are fast approaching the 1,000,000.00 mark. This tremendous growth in our fall sale shows how strong the deer industry is here in Pennsylvania. I believe we have a good chance to break the \$1,000,000.00 mark in 2007. I would like to thank the PDFA auction committee for all of their hard work putting this great sale together along with everyone else that worked those two days.

The board is still reviewing our economic impact study being produced by Tom Shepstone. The review is taking a little longer than expected and I hope to have a final approval at our February board meeting. From that point the study will be available for circulation. As I mentioned in the previous newsletter this will be a very valuable tool to educate our legislators on how important our industry is to Pennsylvania. It is interesting to know that our industry is currently larger then the goat, sheep, tobacco, or Christmas tree industries here in Pennsylvania.

Since the passage of house bill 1580, act 51, all farms should be receiving applications to apply for the new license being issued by the PA Department of Agriculture. If you have any questions call Mary Martin at PDA 717-783-8300. Importations of cervids into PA is now exclusively under PDA and the PGC is no longer involved. Reports from Importation chair Glenn Dice are that imports are going smoothly. The PDA recently asked our board if we would like the importation permit process removed. After much discussion the board voted to keep it in place to assure we protect our industry from disease. Glenn Dice and I recently attended a meeting with he PDA to discuss changes to the CWD, TB, and Brucellosis regulations for interstate and intrastate movement of cervids. Our position of course was to minimize any changes and I was pleased that the Department was sensitive to our concerns.

The 18th Annual NADeFA Conference will be held in Fort Wayne, IN on March 15-17, 2007. This is a great opportunity to meet other deer farmers from around the country. Some of my greatest opportunities have come from the contacts I have made at this conference. If you are deer farming you should make every effort to be there. For more information call NADeFA Executive Director Holly Johnson at 651-345-5600.

Don't forget to mark your calendar for Saturday May 5, 2007. This is the date for our Spring Meeting and Benefit Auction. As we close out this year and prepare for a new one I want to again thank everyone for their hard work and support of the Association. This was a year of great accomplishments for us.

TAX CREDIT PROGRAM COULD BENEFIT PENNSYLVANIA DEER FARMERS

The Keystone Innovation Zone Tax Credit Program was first introduced as part of Governor Ed Rendell's economic stimulus package. Since then the program has significantly contributed to the economic growth of Pennsylvania.

The KIZ program provides transferable tax credits to companies which have been in operation for less than 8 years, operate within one of the targeted industries and are located in a Keystone Innovation Zone. The maximum amount of credits a company can be awarded annually is \$100,000.

Tax credits are awarded based on the increase in a company's gross revenues from one year to the next. These credits can then be sold to another PA based firm for between .85 and .90 cent on the dollar.

For example, Deer Co. operates in a KIZ within the life sciences targeted industry. In year 1, Deer Co.'s gross revenue resulting from activities within the KIZ amounts to \$40,000. In year 2, Deer Co.'s business grows, and their gross revenues from activities within the KIZ amount to \$60,000. In year 3, Deer Co. may apply for a KIZ tax credit of \$10,000 (50% of the \$20,000 increase in gross revenue from year 1 to year 2).

If in year 3, Deer Co.'s gross revenues grow to \$500,000 from activities within the KIZ, the company would be eligible to apply for a maximum KIZ tax credit of \$100,000 in year 4. Their increase from year 2 to year 3 is \$440,000, but 50% of this increase (\$220,000) exceeds the \$100,000 maximum allowable tax credit.

To qualify for credits companies must apply each year no later than September 15th. Tax credit awards will be mailed on or about December 15th of the same year the application is submitted. Applications must be approved by zone coordinators. Zones are scattered across the state. Deer Farmers can qualify for credits because they fall under the life sciences target industry.

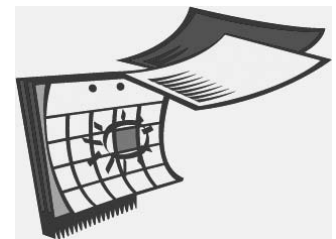

ELECTION 2006

STATE SENATE:

There was no change in the state Senate numbers – the Republicans continue to hold a substantial majority. However, five of most senior members of the Senate were either unseated during the primary or chose to retire.

In Bucks County, Senator Joe Conti (R) was replaced by former state Representative Chuck McIlhinney (R); Luzerne County's Charlie Lemmond (R) was replaced by his former district office staffer Lisa Baker (R); and, Lancaster's Noah Wenger (R) was replaced by Mike Brubaker (R). Conti, Lemmond and Wenger all chose to retire rather than seek re-election. Senators Jubelirer (R - Blair) and Brightbill (R - Lebanon) were unseated during the primary and those seats were filled by John Eichelberger (R) and Mike Folmer (R), respectively.

Aside from McIlhinney, all of the new Senators would be considered "conservative." The Senate currently has 29 Republicans and 21 Democrats.

Leadership:

While the Democrats installed the same group of leaders to their positions, the Senate Republicans brought on a whole new slate of legislative leaders. Joe Scarnati (Jefferson) was elected to the position of President Pro Temp; Dominic Pileggi (Delaware) was elected to the #2 spot of Majority Leader. Senator Gib Armstrong (Lancaster) was successful in his bid to become the next Appropriations Committee Chairman. Also finding their way into leadership: Jane Clair Orié (Allegheny) will be Majority Whip and Mike Waugh (York) will be the new Caucus Chairman.

Committee Chairs

This week, the Senate Republicans selected their committee chairmen. With Mike Waugh serving in a leadership role, he is required to relinquish his chair on the Ag Committee. Newly elected Senator Mike Brubaker (Lancaster) has been appointed to fill Waugh's seat.

Retiring Game Committee Chairman Joe Conti will be replaced by incoming freshman Senator Chuck McIlhinney

STATE HOUSE:

This is where most of the excitement was on election night. Even now, it is not 100% certain which party will control the House. The Republicans hold the House

by the slimmest margin of 102-101. The key to control is in a suburban Chester County legislative district, formerly held by retiring Representative E.Z. Taylor.

On Election Day, the Republican seemed to have won by 19 votes. However, the Democrat in the race was just declared the winner in the 156th. Only time will tell whether the number stays 102-101 for the Democrats – the Republicans have petitioned the courts for a recount and it's very possible for the R's to "flip" one or two Democrats and maintain control. It might not be until January until we know for sure who has control of the House.

The biggest surprise in the House races came from Beaver County, as Mike Veon – currently the #2 guy in the Democratic Caucus – was unseated by Republican challenger Jim Marshall. Mike was one of only two Democrats that were unseated in the General Election. Representative Shawn Flaherty (Allegheny), who won a special election to fill the Jeff Habay seat, was taken out by Republican challenger Randy Vulakovich.

The Republican Caucus lost a total of nine seats in the House. Five incumbent Republicans were taken out by their Democratic challengers; and, four open seats that were occupied by Republicans (in Allegheny, Center, Schuylkill and Berks Counties) shifted to the D's as well. Republican representatives that lost their general election bid include Representatives Good (Erie), Diven (Allegheny), Wright (Bucks), McGill (Montgomery), and Gannon (Delaware).

The loss of the Schuylkill County seat formerly held by Bob Allen was the most surprising. Allen was unseated in the primary by "ultra-conservative" Gary Hornberger. But, Hornberger's local party leaders worked against him in the general election, urging registered Republicans to support the Democratic candidate instead.

House Leadership:

With the handful of Republican leaders that retired and the Democrats' #2 guy taken out in the general election, there was a lot of posturing over who would lead the two caucuses in the coming session. Leadership elections were held November 14th.

John Perzel (Philadelphia) and Sam Smith (Jefferson) will continue in their

roles as Speaker and Majority Leader respectively. David Argall (Schuylkill) held on to his title as Republican Whip. And, Merle Phillips went unopposed as Caucus Administrator. New leaders include Sandra Major (Susquehanna) who was elected Caucus Chairperson; Jerry Stern (Blair) as Caucus Secretary; and, Mike Turzai (Allegheny) is Republican Policy Committee.

The most contentious race for the Republican Caucus was for Majority Chair of the Appropriations Committee (effectively, the #3 position for the R's). Five legislators announced their intentions to run for the position. In the end, the R's selected Mario Civera (Delaware) to serve in this powerful position.

Mario, who formerly served as Policy Committee Chairman and Professional Licensure Committee Chair, has a reputation for fairness, honesty and being an accomplished negotiator. He's been a great friend to us over the years.

Democratic Leader Bill DeWeese won re-election to that position and was successful in installing his slate of candidates to the various positions. Mark Cohen and Dwight Evans will continue their tenure as Caucus Chairman and Appropriations Committee Chair; while Keith McCall (Carbon) will serve as the new Democratic Whip replacing Mike Veon. Also, Todd Eachus (Luzerne) was unopposed in his run for Democratic Policy Chair. Frank Dermody (Allegheny) will be the new Caucus Secretary and Dan Surra (Elk) will serve as Democratic Caucus Administrator.

If the Democratic win in the 156th sticks and the D's take over control of the House, look for everyone on the D side to move up one spot, while the R's move down one (Perzel becoming the Minority Leader, Smith becomes Whip, etc.).

Committee Chairs:

There will be a tremendous amount of change in the committees in the House. With 50 new members, the likelihood of a change in leadership in the House and all of the retiring committee chairmen, about half of the faces on all of the committees will be new ones.

INFORMATION FROM THE PDA

PREMISES ID

The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (PDA) has mailed premises ID numbers to all PDA program participants and licensees. This number is to be used on PDA forms to correctly identify your farm. For example: submission forms sent to a laboratory (Penn State, New Bolton Center or PVL), inventory forms, inspection forms or receipts (this number replaces the propagator number). If you have not received a premises ID number or if you have any questions, please call your regional PDA office.

MANDATORY HERD CERTIFICATION PROGRAM (HCP) AND HERD MONITORED PROGRAM (HMP)

At the end of August, a mass mailing was sent out giving specifics for the mandatory CWD program to all cervid owners who were on the voluntary CWD program and cervid owners who were propagators. The deadline for choosing which program you desire is March 1, 2007. Anyone not in compliance at that time will receive fines of \$300 every 30 days. The paperwork must be completed by all herd owners with susceptible species of cervids, including those already enrolled in the voluntary program.

The HCP requires two forms of identification (both forms must be placed by the end of 2007), test all deaths 12 months of age and older, annual inspection, annual updated inventory and additions must be from herds of equal (month, day, year) status or higher. Cervids from this program can be sold to anyone (watch status).

The HMP is for those herds that cannot/will not put identification on the cervids or provide accurate inventory. Inspections are done at PDA's discretion. Herd owner must submit annual inventory showing additions/deletions. Testing requirements are based on the source of the cervids. If sources are non-program test 100% up to 30 per year, if sources are program test 10% up to 30 per year and if sources are cer-

tified herds no testing required.

An inventory must be submitted with either program. HMP can be an estimated inventory and HCP can be what information you have available now and as ID is added, keep track and submit with annual inventory.

MOVEMENT REQUIREMENTS

Cervids on the herd certification program are eligible to move inter/intrastate. Cervids on the herd monitored program are eligible to move intrastate only to a shooting preserve or slaughter facility once a total of 30 animals have been tested for CWD. Contact your regional office to discuss a special permit if the testing cannot be met.

To date, CWD has not been found in Pennsylvania.

**** The federal rule for the national CWD program has been stayed indefinitely. PDA will provide information as we receive it. ****

CERVIDAE LIVESTOCK OPERATOR LICENSE (CLO)

A CLO license application was included in the mass mailing. This license replaces the propagators permit. There is no fee at this time. All cervids behind a fence must have a CLO including: zoos, farms, hunting preserves and owning them as pets. The only exception is a herd owner that has a menagerie permit (issued by PGC).

RADIO FREQUENCY IDENTIFICATION (RFID) TAGS

Once you have received your premises ID number, you can receive the 840 RFID tags at no charge from Dr. Kendra Stauffer, USDA-APHIS-VS at 717-575-2934. At this time, these 840 RFID tags are considered an official form of ID by NAIS and may become mandatory by 2010.

CERTIFIED CWD TECHNICIAN (CCT) REMINDER

- Wear latex or vinyl type gloves while collecting brain specimens
- Wear face shield
- Use a cut-resistant glove over your latex or vinyl gloves to further protect yourself
- DO NOT** collect from any cervid showing clinical signs compatible with rabies or CWD. Contact your regional PDA office to have a federal, state or accredited veterinarian collect the sample from the animal or submit the animal to one of the PADLS laboratories.

TUBERCULOSIS AND BRUCELLOSIS UPDATE

On April 26, 2006, the requirement of USDA for accreditation for tuberculosis was changed extending the term for which accredited herd status is valid from two to three years (33-39 months). In addition, the number of consecutive tests of all eligible captive cervids to accredit a herd is now two (had been three).

By March, the federal ruling for Brucellosis is anticipated to be comparable to the requirements for Tuberculosis. It is unknown what the requirements will be for those herds that now have two years of testing and are due this fall. It has been recommended that the third test be done, however the option is available to wait and see what the ruling will say. If you choose the latter, there is only a short time until expiration but you could request an extension if you put the request in writing to USDA.

PLANNING FOR 2007 - SETTING PRIORITIES

As many of our farmers do at the end of the year, it is time to evaluate the annual performance of our businesses and organizations. It also allows the opportunity to set goals and priorities for the upcoming year.

We are taking that approach in the Department of Agriculture. With Governor Rendell's support, we look forward to moving Pennsylvania agriculture ahead in 2007. By building on our core programs and advancing our initiatives, we are responding to your business needs while further improving the commonwealth's economy.

The following are a few of the Department's priorities for growing Pennsylvania agriculture in 2007:

- A strong focus remains on helping producers improve farm profitability, regardless of the size or style of their operation, by supporting and developing the following programs:

- √ Center for Dairy Excellence – Providing coordination and focus for Pennsylvania's dairy industry initiatives, positioning the industry to become stronger and more profitable.

- √ Fruit Industry Task Force – Advancing Pennsylvania's fruit industry through marketing, workforce development, risk management and research.

- √ PAgrows – Offering access to funding needed to begin, continue or expand a business through the First Industries Fund.

- √ PA Preferred – Identifying and promoting Pennsylvania foods and products that meet some of the world's highest quality standards.

- √ Ag Renewable Energy Council – Guiding the industry to open markets to new farmers, reducing dependency on foreign fuels, creating new jobs, promoting economic growth, encouraging conservation and building a diversified energy base.

- √ Livestock Protection Program – Establishing a federally-funded program to address the threat to livestock

and crops from coyotes, geese, black vultures and European starlings.

- We are making every effort to keep Pennsylvania's topsoil in agriculture with programs like:

- √ Farmland Preservation – Our nation-leading program ensures Pennsylvania's ability to grow food and fiber for the citizens of the commonwealth for years to come.

- √ Center for Farm Transitions – Assisting farmers looking to get started, make changes to their operations or transition their assets to retire or to pursue new careers.

- Educating the public about the importance of Pennsylvania agriculture and improving the co-existence between farm and non-farm communities is key to the growth of the industry. We plan to continue these efforts through:

- √ Marketplace for the Mind – Serving as a resource for teachers, students or anyone interested in agriculture to learn more about the industry.

- √ Agriculture, Communities and Rural Environment (ACRE) – Legislation striking a balance between farmers and communities by creating a process for farmers to seek review of ordinances believed to be illegal and restrictive of normal agricultural or farming operations.

- Protecting agriculture and the public takes precedence over all else. We will develop a state-of-the-art Biosecurity Level 3 surveillance and laboratory system with the capacity to deal with Avian Influenza, Chronic Wasting Disease, Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy (BSE) and other potential foreign animal diseases.

- The infrastructure necessary to sustain our farm businesses will be strengthened by the development of regional initiatives through collaborative efforts and leveraging state funds with local and private funds.

- The Bureau of Dog Law will undergo restructuring and develop new

legislation to improve its ability to protect consumers and our animal companions alike.

- We will further encourage and support conservation practices like no-till farming, nutrient management and other stewardship programs to protect the natural environment.

- The PA Preferred Healthy Vending Initiative will expand to offer our students healthy vending choices with PA Preferred products in Pennsylvania schools.

- Producers shared their thoughts and concerns during the public listening sessions during the past year. Governor Rendell plans to use that information to suggest changes in the 2007 Farm Bill.

Our plate is full for the next year – but the Pennsylvania agricultural industry deserves the attention. We are committed to finding options, solutions and alternatives to help our farmers maintain profitable businesses. Under Governor Rendell's leadership, we can keep the momentum going to keep our industry moving forward.

Two men went bear hunting. While one stayed in the cabin, the other went out looking for a bear. He soon found a huge bear, shot at it but only wounded it.



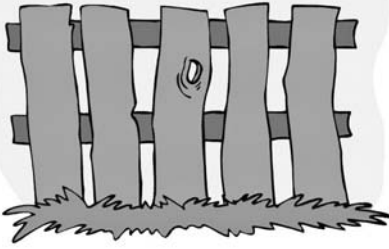
